I Check Their Leaves, I Water Their Roots...

I decided sometime in my late 50's that I needed a hobby. Well, not really *needed a hobby*. But I did think that my world of going to the gym (half-heartedly), teaching and conducting behavioral research (both often with relish), reading (for pleasure), and interacting with my husband (not necessarily in that order), seemed limited and unbalanced.

So I set out on a quest.

I had never thought of myself as a collector (except perhaps of dust from all the housework I have postponed

until retirement). I didn't have an interest in crafts like knitting or woodworking, or candle dipping. My childhood music and painting lessons certainly fanned my life-long passion as a listener/viewer, but, not as a creator. I had always loved flowering things. Why shouldn't I tackle the most beautiful of plants? I would try to grow orchids!

So I bought one, rescued another, and within a year or two or four had sixty orchids in our small house. I say this with a mixture of pride and embarrassment, the way some multiple cat owners blushingly admit to the numbers they own. ("And they really do keep each other company," my cat -loving friends insist.) My plants line the windows in the dining room, pack three shelves in the study, and fill the bookcases in our family room.

I am not a good grower. I'm not even a mediocre grower. Many of my plants have nice green leaves but have never spiked or bloomed. But sometimes in late winter, in early spring or in late fall, our house is filled with color from those plants I am able to coax into flowering. White, pink, yellow, brown, and especially varying depths of purple color dominate. The blooms, like flocks of cartoon moths, flutter in the currents of air from our humidifier, flights of color and loveliness heralding a new season. I love the mystery of not knowing what the flowers will look or even smell like on new plants. Some will perfume the air with subtle sweetness, others will smell like chocolate, and a few will remind me of wet, musty socks.

I love the challenges of science, skill, and luck involved in growing these living things. I check their leaves, I water their roots, I kill their bugs. I breathe deeply and fully. And as I go about my tasks, I sometimes enter a state that psychologists call "flow." I feel wholly engaged in the moment of my actions. For an hour or so each day, when my focus is on the operation of orchid keeping, my breathing slows, I feel energized yet calm, and I am "in the groove." I lose my sense of time, and I enter something like what Buddhism calls being "at one with things."

I don't claim that orchid keeping is religious or even spiritual. And my flow experiences are not daily occurrences. But when I lose myself, the experience is so enjoyable, I know that cultivating this state more frequently in my daily life would be desirable.

Tending my orchids can be a metaphor for how to live more fully as I enter "older" age. Perhaps those pressing life decisions that I have postponed won't be so difficult to make after all. Maybe the day will turn out more lovely and calm than I thought it would. Can I tend my life the way I tend my orchids, engaged wholly with my actions in the moment, without worrying about future spikes and failed blooms? Perhaps I can rest completely in my current actions, free from obsessive worries about the future, or sad regrets about the past.

All that is, is here now. This moment. These leaves, these roots, and even these bugs. I check, I tend, and I water. I breathe deeply in the moment. In this moment of being alive.


